What happens now

- Some real estate agents know about the Tacoma Smelter Plume, but not all.
- . Buyers new to the area often don't know about the plume.

Ideas for the future

- . More education for real estate agents.
- . Require real estate agents to provide a pamphlet to buyers, similar to the one for lead-based paint.
- . Require sellers to sample soils prior to sale.

What happens now

- You have to go to Ecology's website to see if your property is in the plume.
- . Some permit offices are looking at requiring soil sampling and cleanup for certain types of projects.

Ideas for the future

- Local governments create a Tacoma Smelter Plume "hazard zone" similar to an earthquake or flood zone.
- Require land owners to sample and cleanup their property when they are doing any earth moving that requires a grading permit.

We may have funding left over after cleaning up yards in the high zone and play areas. If so, we would look at the areas we did not already address.
