Summary of PLP Search and Site History Former Irondale Iron and Steel Plant

The Former Irondale Iron and Steel Plant produced iron and/or steel intermittently from 1881 to 1919 (Britton, 1991; Roe, 1995). Owner/operators of the plant during this period consisted of the Puget Sound Iron Company of Washington Territory (1879-1882), Puget Sound Iron Company of California (1882-1889), Pacific Steel Company (1901-1904), Seattle Iron and Steel Company (1903-1904), Irondale Furnace Company (1906-1908), Irondale Steel Company (1908-1909), Western Steel Company (1909-1913), and Pacific Coast Steel Company of Seattle (1914-1919).

I checked with the Washington Secretary of State's Office on January 11, 2007 (see attached e-mail). They responded to me by phone on the same day with the answers to my questions (shown in the above table).

Historical Notes

According to Britton (1991, p. 85) two oil-fired 20 ton capacity open hearth furnaces were installed at the site in the summer of 1909. In the spring of 1910, the first fuel oil shipment arrived at the plant and was transferred into a "steel-lined concrete tank with a six thousand-barrel capacity located just south of the blast furnace area" (Britton, 1991, p. 88).

Bethlehem Steel Corporation was dissolved in 2003 following its 2001 bankruptcy.

Cotton Engineering and Shipbuilding was not listed in the 1941 Port Townsend phone book. It is shown in the 1952, 1953, 1954, and 1958 phone books at an address of 126 Madison. The 1952 Metsker's Atlas for Jefferson County shows that H. Cotton and Myrtle Cotton owned several parcels in Port Townsend in addition to the Irondale site. Cotton Engineering and Shipbuilding does not appear in the 1961 phone book. According to the Office of the Secretary of State, Cotton Engineering and Shipbuilding changed its name to "Cotton Corporation" in 1962 and their corporation license expired in 2002.

The only known commercial use for the former steel mill site after the mill shut down in 1919 was as a log storage yard by the Port Townsend Paper Company. Logs were stored at the site from about 1977 to 1999 (JCHHS, 2001).
