Agreed Order for Remedial Investigation/Feasibility Study Proposed, Early SEPA Scoping Notice

The Washington State Department of Ecology (Ecology) is providing an opportunity for the public to comment on upcoming activities at the Welch's Plant in Kennewick, Ecology Facility/Site # 89931898, located at 10 E Bruneau, Kennewick.

The Welch's Plant (the Site) has soil and groundwater contaminated with petroleum. Ecology has drafted an Agreed Order for a Remedial Investigation/Feasibility Study (RI/FS), which will gather more information about how much contamination is present as well as options for cleanup. In addition, Ecology would like to provide the public an opportunity to participate in the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) early scoping process to help identify environmental issues that need to be evaluated at the Site.

Site Background

The site is a food processing facility that was formerly owned and operated by Welch Foods, Inc. (Welch's) and is now owned by Lieb Properties II, LLC.

In August 2006, PBS Engineering and Environmental (PBS) conducted a Phase 2 Environmental Assessment. This assessment was the first time petroleum contamination was discovered in soil and groundwater. PBS determined the source of contamination was two 12,000-gallon underground storage tanks that were removed in the 1970s.

Ecology Wants Your Comments!

PBS excavated the contaminated soil on the site. They submitted two additional reports—a Limited Underground Storage Tank Assessment and a Soil Remedial Action Report—both of which were received by Ecology on August 25, 2006. PBS reported removal of contaminated soil to the depth of the water table, approximately 21 feet. Sampling results from the contaminated soil stockpile confirmed diesel and oil contamination above state cleanup levels. Sampling results from groundwater confirmed diesel and oil contamination above state cleanup levels.

What is a RI/FS?

The Agreed Order requires Welch's to conduct an RI/FS. The RI/FS will document additional sampling data and provide an evaluation of cleanup options. Ecology will oversee the project to ensure that all terms of the Agreed Order are satisfied.

Determination of Non-Significance

After reviewing a State
Environmental Policy Act (SEPA)
environmental checklist, Ecology has
made a decision that the RI/FS
process will not have a significant
adverse impact on the environment.
The checklist and Determination of
Non-Significance are part of the
documents available for public
comment.
