Machine Shop Checklist #10: Universal Waste Fluorescent Lamps



Fluorescent lights and lamps often contain toxic chemicals that fall under the dangerous waste regulations. It's easier to manage them as a <u>universal waste</u>.¹

Two disposal options

1. Switch to more energy-efficient LEDs

At end of life, LED lights are not dangerous waste.

2. Recycle your spent fluorescent lights as universal waste

- Put the spent lights in a box to prevent breakage.
 - Keep the box closed.
 - Label the box with "Universal Waste Lamps" and the date you put the first lamp into the box.
 - Send full boxes off with a vendor or recycler within one year of the date on the box.
- Put broken lights into a separate sealed container capable of containing the glass and debris. Don't put the broken lights and whole lights in the same box.
- If needed, ask Ecology for a vendor list.

Businesses that purchase bulbs at retail in Washington can recycle mercury-containing lights for free by dropping them off at <u>collection sites</u>² throughout the state.
