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Join the Skagit Stream Team Skagit County is blessed with a myriad of streams, lakes, and rivers. Not only are these waterways our source for drinking water, but we also use them for irrigation, agriculture, industry,



hydroelectric dams, and recreation.

The Skagit Stream Team is once again looking for a few good folks to monitor the quality of water in the Samish and Skagit River watersheds. Teams of 3 to 4 people check a stream's temperature, salinity, dissolved oxygen, and depth once a month. Samples are then brought back to the Padilla Bay lab where another volunteer tests for fecal coliform and turbidity. The goal is to collect 9 months of accurate water quality data to share with interested agencies. The program provides hands-on learning about natural systems, land-use impacts, and stream/ estuary health.

Orientation and training will be at the Interpretive Center on: Wednesday, September 6th, from 6:00-8:30PM, Thursday, September 7th, from 6:00-8:30PM Saturday, September 9th from 9:00AM-3:00PM

Lew Moore Named New Northwest Straits

Commission Director

The Northwest Straits Commission has named Lew Moore as its new Director, replacing Tom Cowan, who recently retired. Moore, a resident of Everett, served as the chief of staff of Congressman Jack Metcalf, and was the co-facilitator of the bipartisan Murray-Metcalf panel that created the Commission.



"We are excited to have Lew Moore as our new Director," said Commission Chair Duane Fagergren. "He was a key player in the founding of the Commission and understands the unique role we play in north Puget Sound protection."

The Northwest Straits Marine Conservation Initiative was a result of the work of a diverse panel convened in 1997 by Senator Patty Murray (D) and then Congressman Jack Metcalf (R). This federally funded program takes a "bottom-up" approach to protecting and restoring the marine resources of the Northwest Straits. It blends well-founded science with grassroots consensus building through the actions of seven marine resources committees (MRCs). These groups are citizen-based, with representatives from the scientific community, local and tribal governments, and economic, recreational and conservation interests.

The thirteen member Northwest Straits Commission supports the MRCs by funding their volunteer efforts, insuring a scientific ecosystem focus, and undertaking regional projects. Projects undertaken by the Commission and the MRCs include removing abandoned gill nets and crab pots from Puget Sound, conducting nearshore habitat surveys, planting native Olympia oysters, and removing creosote logs from beaches.

"I am grateful for the opportunity to help continue the cooperative, action-based work of the Commission, stated Moore. "We will continue to work with local communities to take specific measures to improve the health of the beautiful waters we live by." Moore joins Project Specialist, Sasha Horst, and Marine Program Coordinator, Ginny Broadhurst in newly remodeled offices in the Breazeale House.
