Air Quality Fee Regulation

Ecology proposes to adopt amendments to Chapter 173-455 WAC, Air Quality Fee Regulation. The rule proposal will be published in the Washington State Register on September 5, 2012. The Air Quality Fee Regulation contains fees for a number of air quality activities. This rule-making mainly focuses on the Registration Program that requires certain small- and medium- sized businesses to register with Ecology. These businesses are inspected to ensure proper compliance with regulations. They pay a fee based on how much they pollute.

The purpose of this rule proposal is to:

- Increase yearly fees for businesses that report their emissions every three years (periodic sources) from \$400 to \$450, \$700, or \$1000 based on their emission rates. Late fees also increase from \$50 to \$68. The Legislature directed Ecology to increase these fees. They have not been changed in 17 years since they were adopted in April 1995.
- Charge gasoline dispensing facilities a yearly \$130 fee for each storage tank dispensing gasoline. The fee is proposed to begin on July 1, 2013. The Department of Revenue will collect the fee as part of renewing a business license.

Ecology proposes to re-establish air quality inspection fees for gasoline dispensing facilities (mainly gas stations) in counties regulated by Ecology. This includes most of central and eastern Washington as well as San Juan County. A gasoline station regulated by a local air agency is *not* covered under this rulemaking.

Re-establishing the gasoline vapor recovery inspection program reduces the health risk from benzene (a carcinogen) exposure at and near gasoline dispensing facilities, and reduces the formation of ground-level ozone (contributor to smog).

Insert the rates used to calculate the 2012 annual registration fees and remove the existing process in the rule to calculate these fees. The 2012 rates are established by following the existing method in the rule and then increased by 36 percent as directed by the Legislature.

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- Provide a new process for making future fee increases for most fees in Chapter 173-455 WAC. This change will not result in any additional fee increases at this time. Ecology proposes to link fee increases to the Washington fiscal growth factor based on the cost of running the program without going through rule-making. This means smaller, more frequent increases instead of larger, infrequent increases.
- Improve readability of the rule and clarify the rule's intent. "Housekeeping" changes include:
 - ✓ consolidating registration program fees in one location;
 - ✓ correcting word use;
 - clarifying that an applicant can use the existing \$200 fee for pre-application assistance with the Prevention of Significant Deterioration permit. Ecology is continuing our current practice of holding a pre-application meeting between applicants and staff; and
 - ✓ updating the list of general orders.

What counties are regulated by Ecology's air quality program?

The counties regulated by Ecology's air quality program include most of central and eastern Washington as well as San Juan County. Local air agencies are responsible for ensuring compliance with federal, state, and local rules in the other counties.

Ecology's counties include:

Why is Ecology re-establishing fees to pay for a vapor recovery inspection program?

Gasoline vapor recovery systems that are not routinely inspected for compliance with air quality requirements are much more likely to fail, putting people at risk. Gasoline vapors contain benzene, a carcinogenic chemical. Gasoline vapors also contain volatile organic compounds that contribute to ground-level ozone, another human health hazard and a contributor to climate change. If safety measures are not in place, these harmful fumes can escape as gasoline is transferred into storage tanks or dispensed at the pump.
