Cleaning up the Past, Creating a Brighter Future

The Department of Ecology (Ecology) and the City of Bothell (City) have partnered to clean up contaminated sites and create a cleaner and healthier future for the residents of Bothell.

The City is upgrading infrastructure and bringing in new retail, offices, and housing under its Downtown Revitalization Plan launched in 2006. Several properties identified for redevelopment are contaminated from historical commercial uses and need to be cleaned up to protect human health and the environment. Oversight of this cleanup work is provided by Ecology under the State's cleanup law called the Model Toxics Control Act (MTCA).

Ecology has awarded more than \$6.5 million in grants to the City to support cleanup activities at six contaminated sites in the historic downtown area. This funding provides needed support as the City revitalizes its historic downtown. At some sites, state funding has covered as much as 90% of cleanup activity costs.

Ecology administers funding through the Remedial Action Grant Program, which provides partial funding to help public entities clean up contaminated sites. The Legislature funds the grant program with revenues from a tax on hazardous substances.



Washington's Formal Cleanup Process

Ecology has established a clearly defined process for cleaning up contaminated sites. Using thorough site analysis, planning, design, and monitoring, this process is designed to ensure that the site cleanup is both effective and protective of human health and the environment.

Cleanup and Revitalize

The Department of Ecology (Ecology) has awarded more than \$6.5 million to the City of Bothell to assist with cleaning up six contaminated sites.
