

Focus On: UST Fee Increase in 2022

The Department of Ecology previously raised tanks fees from \$160.00 to \$192.58, with four separate fee increases in July of 2017, 2018, 2020 and 2021.

Underground storage tank (UST) fees will increase from \$192.58 to \$204.13 per tank on July 1, 2022

This fee increase will provide funding to offset decreasing federal funding assistance and increasing program costs. Washington's UST Program financing is outlined below.

UST Program Financing

Funding Sources: Washington's UST Program has three main sources of funding: UST fees, Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) grant funds, and the Model Toxics Control Operating Account.

Revenues

Since State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2010, program revenues have declined from approximately \$2.4 million a year to about \$2.2 million a year. This decline is largely due to reductions in EPA grant funding. Revenues have stabilized over the last several years but have increased sufficiently to meet previous levels.

Expenditures

Tank fees help fund the UST regulatory program. Currently, the fees do not cover the entire state cost of the program, which is funded by a combination of federal grants, Model Toxics Control Operating Account, and the per-tank fee. Since SFY 2010, Ecology has used Model Toxics Control Account money to help fund UST Program expenditures, as federal funding has declined and operational costs to run the program have increased. The increases are mainly for cost-of-living and benefit rate adjustments supporting the UST inspector staff. Ecology anticipates these types of program costs will continue to increase.

Fiscal Growth Factor

As required by law, the fiscal growth factor was used to determine the amount of the fee increase. The fiscal growth factor is calculated and adopted by the Economic and Revenue Forecast Council using the average growth in state personal income for the previous ten SFY.

Future Fee Increases

Ecology will reassess the program budget in the future to determine if this fee increase is enough to close the budget gap.
