Cleanup process moving forward

The Department of Ecology (Ecology) is overseeing a cleanup of the Spic N Span Cleaners site in the International District. The Seattle Chinatown International District Preservation and Development Authority (SCIDpda), a community development organization in Seattle, is cleaning up this site. Ecology is providing funding for this cleanup through our Affordable Housing Cleanup Grant Program. This program ensures sites are "cleaned up properly while promoting community engagement and ensuring affordable housing in the process."

We would like your comments on the following documents:

Prospective Purchaser Consent Decree (PPCD): a legal agreement that directs the purchaser(s) to implement cleanup at the site and provides the purchaser(s) a settlement of liability.

Public Participation Plan: a document that explains how people can participate in the cleanup process.


Site background

The Seattle Chinatown International District Preservation and Development Authority (SCIDpda1) was formed in 1975 to preserve, promote, and develop the Seattle Chinatown International District (CID). SCIDpda's mission areas are affordable housing and commercial property management, real estate development, and

community economic development and community engagement.

SCIDpda is creating a community development project at 652 South Dearborn St., Seattle WA (site), in the heart of the CID. It will be comprised of affordable family-housing and will be a mixed-use building, with a community-use space on the ground floor. Some highlights include:

- 77-120 residential units
- 100% affordable housing
- Affordable units will be priced between 30%-60% of the area median income (AMI)
- First floor will be a community amenity

The need for a PPCD at this site arises from the historical uses at the property. It was a dry cleaner from 1963 to 2019, which resulted in areas of dry-cleaning related contamination to soil, soil gas, and groundwater. The extent of the contamination will be determined in the remedial investigation.

Site cleanup progress

Several environmental investigations and cleanup efforts have been conducted at the site, including the removal of two underground storage tanks in 1998 and the installation of a treatment system from 2001 to 2004. The site was enrolled in the <u>Voluntary Cleanup Program</u>² (VCP) from 2002 through 2008 and from 2012 until 2019. The owner characterized the site and developed an initial cleanup approach while in the VCP. The owner installed and operated an additional treatment system to address contaminants at the site from 2021 to 2022. Sampling is ongoing to assess the effectiveness of this treatment system.

Contamination

Prior investigations have confirmed the presence of contaminants in the soil, soil gas, and groundwater of the site. These contaminants include chlorinated solvents and mineral spirits from dry cleaning operations, released to groundwater, soil, and soil gas. These contaminants were found at levels above the state's cleanup law, the Model Toxics Control Act (MTCA³). MTCA requires these contaminants to be cleaned up.

Why this site matters

This site cleanup is made possible in part by funding from Ecology's <u>Affordable Housing Planning Grants</u>⁴. SCIDpda intends to apply to Ecology for an <u>Affordable Housing Cleanup Grant</u>⁵ in early 2024. Washington is in dire need of affordable housing across the state. Contamination, or even the suspicion of contamination, drives up the costs of housing development. The large cost leaves little incentive for developers to build affordable housing.

In addition to the usual risks of redevelopment, cleaning up contaminated sites can be a complex process with considerable risk. The cost and time associated with cleaning up a site is often poorly understood; as a result, many sites are left vacant or underused for years, even decades. Supporting cleanups for affordable housing helps make sure the cleanup gets done, protecting the community's health and the environment. Ecology developed the Affordable Housing Cleanup Grant Program (AHCGP) to help advance environmental cleanups for affordable housing developments. These grants can cover remedial action costs, including planning, investigative, and technical work needed to clean up contaminated sites. The purpose of the AHCGP is to expedite the cleanup and redevelopment of contaminated sites into affordable housing use and lessen the impact of cleanup costs.

What happens next?

Ecology will consider all comments received and may amend the documents based on your comments. After that, the PPCD and Public Participation Plan will be finalized, and the formal cleanup will begin. A Remedial Investigation and Feasibility Study will then be completed. Results from the Remedial Investigation and Feasibility Study will lead to a Cleanup Action Plan. Drafts of the Remedial Investigation and Feasibility Study as well as the Cleanup Action Plan will be available for public review and comment. (See graphic below.)
