Environmental Specialists

A degree isn't required! You can qualify with 4–10 years of experience in environmental science or related work, or use a degree to count for some of that time.

Environmental Engineers

A degree isn't required! You can qualify with 5–6 years of engineering or related experience, or a BS/EIT with 1–2 years of experience. Higher levels require a Professional Engineer (PE) license plus additional experience.

Administrative Support

A high school diploma or GED is the minimum requirement for certain support roles, while others require more specialized training.

Examples of support roles include:

- Office assistants and secretaries
- Information technology / desktop support
- Safety and fleet managers
- Records managers
- Technical editors
- Communicators
- Human Resources specialists

Why Nuclear Waste Program?

The Nuclear Waste Program regulates cleanup at the Hanford Nuclear Reservation and oversees other nuclear facilities in Washington. The Hanford Site produced two-thirds of the nation's plutonium for nuclear weapons between 1943 and 1989. Today, Hanford is one of the most complex and toxic cleanup sites in the nation.
