# Mercury Containing Lights Recycling Program Changes Focus Sheet

#### **Overview**

On March 28, 2024, Governor Inslee signed <u>House Bill 1185<sup>1</sup></u> which updated two laws related to the sale, collection, and disposal of mercury containing lights sold within the state of Washington. The changes will impact the <u>LightRecycle Program</u><sup>2</sup>. The original law that created LightRecycle contained a clause that would have ended the program in 2025. Allowing the program to end would have eliminated safe and convenient options for Washington residents to manage mercury containing lights when they reach end of life. In addition to extending the program, the bill made further changes which are summarized below.

### Ban on Sale of

#### **Mercury Containing Lights**

Revised Code of Washington (RCW) <u>70A.230.020<sup>3</sup></u> was amended to include a ban on the sale of mercury containing lights. Beginning on January 1, 2029, the sale of compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs) and linear fluorescent lamps is prohibited within the state of Washington. The prohibition does not apply to lamps already in stock at instate stores on January 1, 2029. However, lamps already in stock at stores must be sold within six (6) months. These lamps can no longer be sold after July 1, 2029<sup>4</sup>.

The sales ban does NOT apply to the following types of mercury containing lights:

• Special purpose bulbs including:

- Lamps for image capture such as for copying machines
- $\circ$   $\;$  Lamps with a high proportion of UV light

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- Lamps for germicide/disinfection/fly trapping
- o Lamps for generating ozone
- Lamps for growing coral symbioses
- Sun lamps
- Lamps for medical/veterinary treatment, diagnosis, or medical devices
- Lamps for manufacture and quality control of pharmaceutical products
- Lamps for spectroscopy
- Lamps for research by academic institutions
- CFLs to replace lamps in vehicles manufactured before January 1, 2020
- Bulbs for research and medical equipment
- "Casual sale" of mercury containing lamps

# **Enforcement of Sales Ban**

RCW 70A.230.020 allows Ecology to adopt rules for implementation, administration, and enforcement and provides Ecology with enforcement authority. For each first violation a penalty of up to \$1,000 may be assessed. Repeat violations may be assessed a penalty of up to \$5,000.

Potential violations include, but are not limited to:

- Selling prohibited lights that were added to a store's stock after January 1, 2029
- Selling any prohibited lights after July 1, 2029

# **Increased Daily Drop Off Limits**

RCW 70A.230.020 establishes limits to the number of mercury-containing lights that a person can bring to a collection location under the LightRecycle Program. The daily recycling limits for mercury-containing lights was increased from no more than ten (10) bulbs to the limits listed below. New daily limits take effect on January 1, 2025.

• Unlimited screw base compact fluorescent lamps



• Fifteen (15) pin-based compact or linear fluorescent lamps



• Two (2) High intensity discharge lamps



# **Emergency Response and Safety**

The bill also added new safety related items to the list of topics that must be addressed in stewardship plans that direct LightRecycle program operations<sup>5</sup>.Stewardship plans will need to be updated and collection locations will need to be provided with the following required materials:

- Spill/release response plans for use by collection locations
- Worker safety plans for use by collection locations

# **Funding Changes**

The program is currently funded by an environmental handling charge (EHC) assessed on the sale of each mercury containing light sold at retail. The EHC may not be charged starting January 1, 2029 and at that time, producers must fully fund the LightRecycle Program<sup>6</sup>.

#### **Important Dates**

- Bulb limit increase January 1, 2025
- EHC may not be charged January 1, 2029
- Sales ban takes effect January 1, 2029
- Becomes illegal to sell existing inventory July 1, 2029
