Lawn & Garden **Fertilizers**

Yes, its true fertilizers help make a lawn look beautiful by helping it achieve a deep green luster. But have you ever stopped to think what happens to the fertilizer when it rains, or when you over-water? The rain washes the fertilizer along the curb and into our lakes, streams and Puget Sound. The fertilizer then causes algae and other aquatic weeds to grow which uses up oxygen that fish need to survive and interferes with recreational activities like fishing, swimming and boating.

Rather than use fertilizers, consider using a mulching mower and let the clippings serve as a natural fertilizer. However, if you use store-bought fertilizers, follow directions and use sparingly.

Does Your Car Leak Oil?

Before you drive off in the morning, back up a few feet and take a look at the spot where your car was parked overnight. Do you see any sign of an oil leak? If so, those leaks are contributing to water pollution. Leaking oil goes from car to street and is washed from street to storm drain and into our lakes. streams and Puget Sound. Imagine the number of cars in the area and you can imagine the amount of oil that finds its way from leaky gaskets into our water.


EARTH AGENDA SOLUTION

Have oil leaks repaired. Also consider alternative transportation methods. By using the bus system or carpooling you can save wear and tear on your vehicle while contributing to a healthier environment.

Washing Cars in the Driveway

Washing your car in the driveway or in the street contributes to water pollution. How? All the soap, scum and oily grit run along the curb, into storm drains and then to our waterways. That pollution is bad for fish and makes them sick.

If you wash your car at home, wash it on grass or gravel instead of the street or your driveway. Be sure to turn off the water after the car is wet; don't let it run while soaping down your vehicle. Purchase a trigger-type nozzle which automatically shuts off the flow when you release it. Or, better yet, take your vehicle to a car wash where the water is treated and recycled.

Pet Waste

Here's a pollutant you probably haven't thought about-pet--waste. Your pet leaves his/her calling card on the lawn. Guess what happens when it rains? Bacteria from the pet waste ends up in the storm drains where it pollutes our waterways and can make people sick.

Dispose of pet waste properly. The best solution is to flush it down the toilet. Another option is to put it in a plastic bag in your garbage.



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
